The House met according to Adjournment. The Members were call'd, and all present as in the

On reading the Petition of William Vernon, and Keyfar Knighton, Order'd, That Messieurs James Helliday, John Beale, and Foshua George, he appointed a Committee to examine into the feveral Allegations in the faid Petition, and report the fame to the House.

The Petition of Edward Parish and John Parish, was read, and referred to the last mentioned Gentlemen, in order to make their Reports thereon, in relation to the Allegations therein contained.

The Petition of John Aldridge, was read, and granted. By the Lower House of Assembly, May 27, 1730.

John Aldridge of Prince George's County, hath petitioned this House to allow him in Money for Four Thousand and Five Hundred Pounds of Tobacco, at Twelve Shillings and Six Pence Currency per Cent. for a Negroe belonging to him, convicted last Year for a capital Crime; and this

The above Meffige and Petition were fent to the Upper House by Col. Belt, and Capt. Sprige; who return, and fay they delivered the same,

Col. Greenfield, from the Committee appointed to consider of a Tobacco-Law, brought in a Report from the faid Committee, and read it in his Place.

The Report was as followeth, viz. At a Committee of both Houses of Assembly, met at Mrs. Fordan's, May 26, 1730, to consider of a Tobacco-Law. Present

The Committee chose the Hon. Philemon Lloyd, Esq; Chairman, and Richard Lewis, Clerk. Your Committee, having taken into Confideration, the Heads of a Bill, for reftraining People from making too great a Quantity of Tobacco; and being of Opinion, that unless the Quantity hereafter to be made, be very considerably reduced below what hath been made for several Years last past, all other Provisions will, in all Probability, be inesse aual, Your Committe therefore submit to the Consideration of both Houses, Whether it may not be necessary to reduce the Quantity of Tobacco Plants, as follows?

All Taxables employed in making Tobacco tend only All Persons Male or Female House keepers, not having more than one Taxable, each -3000 Each. The Male Children of poor People, between the Age of 12 and 16. - - 2500 3000. White Women allowed, by the former A&, to tend Tobacco. -All Persons, having more than One Taxable, and not more than Four, shall? be allowed to tend Tobacco with each Male Child, from 14 to 16, and all >2500

their Male Servants or Slaves. No Person having 5 Taxables, who work without Doors, shall be only excluded, and Servants allowed any Number of Plants for himself, or any of his Children unand Slaves from 13 to 16, al- der 16 Years of Age, or for any Servant, whether hired or otherwise, or for any Slave under the fame Age. lowed to Plant.

Provision shall be made, to prevent the hiring out half Taxables, in order to evade the Law-That Tradesmen be restrained, as they were intended to be, by the Supplementary Bill, prepared

by the Lower House, last Session. That Payments in Tobacco now fettled and stated by Laws in Force, be reduc'd, in Proportion so the Quantity that Tobacco will be lessen'd, by the propos'd Restrictions, as near as may be;

which your Committee presumes, will be a Fourth Part.

That an Equivalent be paid in Grain at stated Prices, except the Allowances to the Members of Both Houses of Assembly, Judges or Justices in the several Courts of Judicature, and Fees and other Allowances chargeable in the Publick or County Levies; of which, one Fourth Part to be deduced without any Equivalent.
