May it please your Honours, We cannot consent to the Amendment proposed by your Honours to the Bill for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors, fince such a Clause will be inconsistent with the Design of the Bill, and would be a Means of driving those poor People out of the Province, and render some of them incapable to maintain their Fimilies, with such Things as are necessity for their Subsistance: Besides, this House cannot conceive any Reason for preserring the Sheriffs Fees to Debts due to other Creditors; for it is certain, the Expence the Sheriffs are usually at, in supporting Prisoners is very inconsiderable, in Comparison with what they are allowed for it. And it appears, by an Act of Parliament past in the second Year of his present Majesty's Reign, for Relief of Infolvent Debtors, that no fuch Preference is given; but on the contrary, all Prisoners who should take the Oith prescribed by that Statute, if detained for Imprisonment Fees, &c. and upon no other Account, should be dicharged; which this House conceives to be a very proper Example for the Legisliture of this Province to follow: We therefore desire your Honours Sign'd per Order, M.
