May it please your Honours,

This House hath taken into Consideration, the Amendments proposed by your Honour, to the Bill, for laying out the Town now called Marlborough; and believe your Honours are misinformed, concerning Mr. Gant and Mr. Sprigg's having an Interest in the Town, (and their Character and Probity, are unquestionable.) 'Tis true, they are related to some, who are Intereste's there; and if such Relation, is an Objection to their Acting as Commissioner, Philip Lee, Esq; and Mr. Contee, proposed by your Honours, are liable to the same Objection, they being related to Persons interested in the said Town: And therefore, to the End all Disputes concerning the Commissioners named in the Bill, or proposed by your Honours, we propose, that John Stoddart and Robert Pottinger, Persons skilled in Surveying, and no way interested nor related to any that is, be appointed in the Room of Mr. Gant, and Mr. Sprigg. One Penny current Money, is the Rent reserved for every Lott, in all other Towns lately laid out; and we cannot conceive any Reason for making a Difference in this Instance. We agree to changing the Name to Maryborough.

There never was yet any such Appeal, as your Honours propose, from the Determination of the Commissioners; and we conceive, that such Appeal would discourage People from taking up Lotts, for fear of involving themselves
