To the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary of the Province of MARYLAND.

May it please your Lordship,

WE your dutiful Clergy being informed, that for the Good and Benefit of Your Tenants, it is intended, that a Paper Currency shall be Emitted; that it is the general Opinion, it would tend to the Publick Advantage, if the Clergy would take their Allowance in it, at the Rate the Publick Officers do:

AS there are none of Your Tenants, that more sincerely desire the Prosperity of Your Province, than Your Clergy do; so they humbly inform Your Lordship, that they are willing to accept their Forty per Poll, at Ten Shillings per Hundred; provided it be made certain in that Specie, and that their Constitution be preserved entire, without any Alteration (saying the Exchange of the Specie;) And they humbly submit it to Your Lordship, whether you will be pleas'd to communicate this to both Houses of Assembly.
