May it please your Honours,

Benjamin Tasker, Esq; from the Upper House, delivered to Mr. Speaker, the Bill for erecting a Town, on the West Side of Great Choptank River, &c. indors'd: Read a second Time; and will not pass.

The Bill, intituled, *An Act for laying out and applying 3500 l. Current Money of Maryland, for the Uses therein mentioned*, was read the first and second Time, by an especial Order; and passed.

Sent to the Upper House, by Mr. Beale, Mr. Crabb, and Mr. Hammond.

A Bill, intituled, *An Act for continuing Part of an Act, intituled, An Act for laying an Imposition on Tobacco by the Hoghead, for Support of Government; and for Payment of His Lordships Quit-Rents and Alienation Fines, for the Time therein mentioned*, was read the first and second Time, by an especial Order; and passed: Sent to the Upper House, by Mr. Dulany, and Five more.

THE House met according to Adjournment. An ingross'd Bill, intituled, *An Act for Relief of Anthony Parker, Patrick Reiley, and Cleborn Lomax, &c.* was read, and assented to; and sent to the Upper House, with the Paper Bill, by Col. Hanson, and Mr. Hawkins.

John Rousby, Esq; from the Upper House, delivered to Mr. Speaker, the Bill, intituled, *An Act for continuing Part of an Act, intituled, An Act for laying an Imposition on Tobacco, &c.* indors'd: Read the second Time, and with the following Amendments; will pass: Line 3, after the Word of, instead of the Words *the said recited Act*, insert, *viz. An Act for laying an Imposition on Tobacco by the Hoghead, for Support of Government; and for Payment of His Lordship's Quit-Rents and Alienation Fines, for the Time therein mentioned*, made at a Session of Assembly, held at Annapolis, the Eleventh Day of July, 1732. Line 9, after the Word, *Year*, insert these Words, *viz. And be a perpetual Law*. Leave out the Word, *until*, in the 9th Line, and the whole 10th and 11th Lines; and insert the following Clause, *and be it further Enacted, That an Act, intituled, An Act for Settlement of an Annual Revenue upon Her Majesty's Governor within this Province, for the Time being, made at a Session of Assembly, held at Annapolis, the Fifth Day of September, in the Year of our Lord, 1704, be and is hereby repealed, and made void, to all Intents and Purposes.*

Col. Ward, from the Upper House, delivered to Mr. Speaker, the Bill, intituled, *An Act for laying out and applying 3500 l. &c. for the Uses therein mentioned*, indors'd: Read a second Time, and will pass: Which Bill was read here, and passed for Ingrossing.

Col. Tilghman, from the Upper House, delivered to Mr. Speaker, the following Message:

Gentlemen,

By the Upper House of Assembly, 10 April, 1733.

In your printed Votes of 20th of last Month, the following Question and Resolution appear, *viz. Whether by the repealing Law made 5th Day of September, 1704, all Laws antecedent to 26th April, 1704, were not thereby repealed, saving what were there excepted and saved, or not? Resolv'd, in the Affirmative.*

If this House had not been well satisfied in the unalterable Attachment of your House to our Constitution, modelled after that excellent One of our Mother Country, we might have been justly alarmed with the Consequences of such a Resolution; for it is an essential and undoubted Maxim, in the English Constitution, and this House hath accordingly Resolv'd, That no Resolves or Votes of either or both Houses, can make any new Law, or abrogate or repeal any old One.

Besides, this Resolution so generally worded, as it stands in the Prints, may have a dangerous and unjustifiable Influence amongst the inconsiderate Part of the Inhabitants; for, thro' too great a
