Michael Howard, Esq; from the Upper House, delivers Mr. Speaker the following Message, and the Address to His Majesty, ingrossed, and signed by the Governor, and President of the Upper House.

Gentlemen,

By the Upper House of Assembly, 4 April, 1735.

We now send to your House, the Address to His Majesty, signed by His Excellency the Governor, and the President of this House, to be signed as Your House thinks fit; that the same may be sent by the first Opportunity, in Order to be presented to His Majesty.

Benjamin Tasker, Esq; from the Upper House, delivers Mr. Speaker the Bill, entitled, *An Act for the Explaining and carrying into Execution, an Act, entitled, An Act for laying out 3500 l. Current Money, &c.* Indors'd, Read the second Time, and pass'd.

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker issue his Warrant to the Secretary, to make out new Writs of Election, directed to the Mayor, Recorder, and Aldermen, of the City of Annapolis, to elect a Member, to serve in this Assembly, in the room of *Richard Francis*, Esq; whose Election is declared illegal.

The House adjourns 'til To-morrow Morning, Nine o' Clock.

Saturday Morning, April 5, 1735.

THE House met according to Adjournment. The Petition of the Freeholders of *St. Mary's County*, complaining of an undue Election, being heard, and the previous Question being determined, the Question was put, Whether the late Election for *St. Mary's County*, was legal, or not? Resolv'd in the Affirmative.

The House adjourns 'til Monday Morning Nine o' Clock.

Monday Morning, April 7, 1735.

THE House met according to Adjournment: And all were present, except Mr. Read.

The Address to the King's Most Excellent Majesty, sign'd by the Speaker, in Behalf of the House; Sent to the Upper House, by Col. Gale, and *William Stoughton*, Esq;

Mr. Wright, being Sick, hath Leave to go Home.

The House adjourns 'til Two o' Clock in the Afternoon.

Monday, Post Meridiem.

The Bill, intituled, *An Act for the Preservation of Harbours.* Read, and the Amendments propos'd by the Upper House, not being agreed to, will not pass.

An ingross'd Bill, intituled, *An Act for the Explaining and carrying into Execution, an Act, intituled, An Act for laying out and applying 3500 l. &c.* Read, and assented to; and sent to the Upper House, with the Paper Bill, by Mr. Denton, and Mr. Hawkins.

A Supplementary Act to the Act, intituled, *An Act for Quieting Possessions, Enrolling Conveyances, and Securing the Estates of Purchasers:* Read the first Time, and order'd to lie on the Table.

The House adjourns 'til To-morrow Morning Nine of the Clock.
