Which was read, approved, and order'd to be ingross'd. The Bill, intituled, An Act ascertaining the Gauce and Tare of Tobacco. Housheads, & Read a second Time, pass'd; and sent to the Upper House by Mr. Key, and Mr. Hemsley. The House adjourns 'til Two o' Clock in the Afternoon.

Tuesday, Post Meridiem.

The Petition of John Brannock, complaining of an undue Election, in Dorchester County, being read, on full Hearing, was rejected.

Gol. Gale, and Twelve more, were order'd to attend the Governour with the Address prepared Yesterday.

Col. Gale brought in a Bill, intituled, A Supplementary Act, to the Act, intituled, An Act for laying an Imposition on Negroes, and on several sorts of Liquors imported; and, also on Irish Servants; to prevent the Importing too great a Number of Irish Papifts into this Province: Which was read the first Time, and order'd to lie on the Table.

Mr. Key brings in a Bill, intituled, An Act, impowering the Rector, Veftry-Men, and Church-Wardens, of King and Queen Parish, in St. Mary's and Charles Counties, to purchase Two Acres of Land in the faid Parife, in St. Mary's County, to build a Church on: And for raising a Fund, as well to compleat the faid Purchase, and Building, as to repair New-Port Church in Charles County, within the said Parish: Which was read, the first Time, and order'd to lie on the Table.

Wednesday, Post Meridiem.

Col. Gale brings in a Bill, intituled, An Ats for relieving sundry Inhahitants in this Province, from the Charges of Prosecutions, for not burning Tobacco, in Pursuance of an Ats of Assembly, intituled, An AEt for emitting, and making current, Minety Thousand Pounds, current Money of Maryland, in Bills of Credit.

Which Bill he read in his Place, and afterwards it was read in the House, the first Time, and

order'd to lie on the Table.
