This House taking into Consideration the great Arrears due to the Publick, and the great Burthen it will be to the People, to raise so large a Sum by an Assessment, do propose, That all the Publick Allowances which are due, or shall be due, at the End of this present Session, be paid by the Two Treasurers of the Province, out of the Gold they have now in their Hands, at the Rate of Ten Shillings for every Hundred Pounds of Tobacco; And in case the Gold will not be sufficient, that then the Remainder of such Arrears, be paid out of the Paper Money, in the Hands of the said Treasurers, at the same Rate; with which we desire your Honours Concurrence.
