 The House met according to Adjournment &c, Michael Howard Esq from the Upper House Delivers Mr. Speaker the following Message - By the upper House of Assembly April 7th 1736, Gentlemen On Consideration of the Bill Intituled an Act for the Explaining and more effectual Carrying into Execution some part of an Act of Assembly Intituled an Act for Emitting and making Current Ninety Thousand Pounds Current Money in Bills of Credit, This House cannot but be of Opinion that it would conduce more to the Credit of the Paper Currency if no Liberty was allowed for the payment of the Levies and Taxes in Tobacco, and Every Person Obliged to discharge the same in Paper money, and as the Two Houses have agreed to a Report for the advancement of that Currency and to Address the Right Honorable the Lord Proprietary thereon, This House hath Resolved to defer any further debate on the said Bill until next Session

By the Lower House of Assembly April 7th 1736, May it Please your Honor We are greatly surprized that your Honor should Refuse the Conference Proposed by this House on Occasion of your not passing Mr. Carrolls Bill which Refusal we look onto affect by its Consequences many of the Inhabitants of this Province, and as we were of Opinion that a Conference between some Members of Both Houses might be the best means to come to a good Understanding on that Head we were in hopes Your Honor would have agreed thereto, but as this Session as we Apprehend Drawing near to an End, and the Subject Matter of that Message of so great Importance that there may not be time for considering so maturely as should be, a Case which so nearly Concerns the Usage and Constitution of this Province we find ourselves obliged to defer the Consideration thereof till next Session of Assembly
