

Edmund Jennings Esq. from the Upper House delivers M^r Speaker the following Message

By the Upper House of Assembly April 7th 1736
Gentlemen, This House is as much surprized at your Message of this day by M^r King and others, as your House possibly could be at our Refusal of your Proposed Conference for we hoped this House would not be doubted to continue to act consistent with such of their own Resolutions as have been taken so often on the Subject Matter of M^r Carrolls Bill by a Rejection of his petition before the Bill was Brought into your House by our Negative to the Bill, and by our Refusal to your Proposed Conference. Those Resolutions were not hastily Entered into and will require We Imagine as much Consideration before they will be departed from,

We cannot well avoid taking Notice of your speaking of this matter in one part of your Message, as a Subject of so great Importance as to affect many Inhabitant by its Consequences and ~~so~~ nearly concern the Usage and Constitution of this Province and yet in ~~the~~ (Case of your Message) you seem to find yourselves obliged to defer the Consideration thereof till the next Session of Assembly for want of time to Consider it maturely, By such Expressions we hardly can think your House in Earnest as to the Importance of M^r Carrolls Bill in those several Particulars, for we entertain so just a Sense of the Fidelity of your House in discharge of your duty to the Inhabitant of this Province not to be persuaded that no Number of days Weeks or Months would prevent your dispatching what so nearly affects the Country (if it is really so) without deferring it till another Session of Assembly.
