The Bill, entitled, *An Act for raising Six pence per Hogshead, &c.* was Read, and committed for Amendments.

Major *Henry Trippe* was called in, and on his appearing, Mr. Speaker acquainted him, that the House having had his Acceptance of a Place of Trust and Profit under their Consideration, were of Opinion, that such his Acceptance had disqualified him from Serving as a Member; and that therefore, out of a due regard to the Rights and Privileges of the House, as well as in Compliance with the Laws of the Country, and more particularly to preserve that Independance so absolutely necessary in this Branch of the Legislature, *Have Resolved*, that he be Dismissed from his Attendance as a Member, and accordingly by their Order he was to understand that he was Dismissed.
