Ein; when Governor, made him a Present of, and which he is willing to let Mr. Magnemara, our Clerk, have to transcribe: And it appearing, that those, and several Journals of this House, in preceding Assemblies. see not now upon Record in the Assembly-Office, we propose to your Honours, that they may be fairly transcribed by the Clerk of this House. in a Book, or Book, well and lufficiently Bound, for their more effectual Prirvation; and that he may be allowed a reasonable Satisfaction for the Service, when done; with which we desire your Honours Concurrence, and that he may be enabled to collect and receive the same, on his giving a Roccipt to the Segretary of this Province, or to such other Person, demin ting it, in whose Possession any of the Journals of this House semain, which are not Recouded already in the Affembly-Office, and that after their being fairly Transcribed into Book or Books, he be obliged to return them without Diminution.

By the Upper House of Assembly.

Gentlemen,
