That lack Part of the Bill as is designed to establish a Fund for raising a Super of Money, for the Payment of an Agent to transact any Busnels for this Province in London, is foreign to his Majesty's Service in general, and more especially to that, which gave Rife to, and ought to be the only Object of this Bill.

2. That Blending or Tacking two different Matters in the same Bill, in order to force the Consent of any

2. That Blending or I acking two uncerent matters in messame out, in order to force the Content of any Branch of the Lagislature to the One, by the Necessity or Desireableness of the Ocher, has always been constrained as in unparliamentary, unjust, and violent Proceeding; since by that Means the Legislators are not at liberty, has compelled to Act, which is contrary to the very institution and Freedom of Parliaments.

3. That although the method of Facking hath sometimes been used, yet it may be laid down as an unbidointed Truth, that those Persons, who have offered to clog any Bill with a Tack, were always thought Estember or ill Wishers to such Bill, and not those who resided the Bill on account of such an unparliamentary and a such for granted wan would avoid if possible every Sufficient of Distillators the Units we are Step; and as we take for granted you would avoid if possible every Sufficient of Dislike to the Duty we are now endeavouring to shew to his Majesty, we doubt not this Observation alone will prevail with you to pais the Bill with that Amendment.

4. That as you from by your Addresses to the Governor, to value what you shall do in this Affair for his Majesty a Service, as a free and voluntary Contribution; we cannot think it will appear in so meritorious a Light, if you should not concur with our Amendment; since it may be concluded your House would not have consented to some Provision for Louisburg Garrison, without obtaining a Fund for the Payment of an Agent in Englane; and that your Zeal for his Majesty's Service in this Particular had no other Rise but from, and was entirely bounded by, the Defire of having an Agent, Signed per Order, J. Ross, Cl. Up. Ho.

Which being Read, Resolved, That it is the undoubted Right of the House of Delegates, to raile on the People of this Province, any Sum of Money, or other Tax, and for such Time, and in such Manner, and to such Ules and Purpoles, as to them shall seem meet; and that the Upper House have not any Right to propose any Alterations or Amendments, so as to alter or change the substantial or material Parts of any such Bill, sent up to them from this House.

The House adjourns to 2 of the Clock. Post Meridiem.

The House met according to Adjournment. The following ingroffed Addr is to his Excellency, viz.

To his Excellency THOMAS BLADEN, E/q; Governor of Maryland; The Humble ADDRESS of the House of Delegates of the said Province.

May it please your Excellency,

I I S Majesty's Subjects, the People of this Province, are burthened with many Taxes and Charges, of which it requires our utmost Attention to find Ways and Means to ease them. And as there are, by Acts and the Laws of this Province, sundry Fines and Forseitures which we humbly conceive ought to be appropriated to the Support of Government; as also Amerciaments in the Provincial Court, an Account of the Disposal whereof hath not for many Years been rendered to the House of Delegates.

We therefore pray, that your Excellency will order to be laid before this House Accounts of all the Fines, Forfeitures, and Amerciaments, that have arisen and been paid; and how, and to what Uses applied, in

the Support of this Government, from the Year 1715 to this Time.

Being prepared, was Ordered, on Behalf of the House, to be signed by the Honourable Speaker; which being done, Major Sheredine and Capt. Hopper are sent to acquaint his Excellency, that this House hath prepared an Address to him, and desires to know when and where he will be pleased to receive it: They return, and acquaint Mr. Speaker, his Excellency will receive it immediately in the Conference-Chamber.

Mr. Smith, with Three others, sent to present the Address: They return,

and acquaint Mr. Speaker, they have presented it.

The Bill for Limitation of Officers Fees was read the Second Time, pas-

sed, and sent to the Upper House by Col, Colvill and Col. Hall.

The Bill, entituled, A supplementary Att to the Att, entituled, An Att appossting Commissions for dividing St. Mary's & c. was Read the Second Time, Passen, and tent to the Upper House by Mr. Barnes, and Mr. Mills.

The Bill, entituled, An additional supplementary Act to the Act, entituled, An Act for laying out and erecting a Town at a Place called Long-Point, on the Well fide of North-east River in Cæcil County; was Read the Second Time, Passed, and sent to the Upper House by Gol. Colvill, and Mr. Hyland.

The House adjourns 'til To-morrow Morning 9 of the Clock.
