several Sheriffs have been desicient in the Payment of the Money received by them in their respective Counties on account of Ordinary Licenses, &c.

An Ingrossed Bill, entituled, An Act for ascertaining the Allowance of Petit Furors attending the Provincial Court, and to limit Costs with respect to Evidences; was Read, and Assented to, and sent to the Upper House, with the Paper Bill, by Maj. Hall, and Mr. Pearce.

An Ingrossed Bill, entituled, An Act for laying out one Acre of Land convenient to Rock-Creek Landing, on Potomack River, on the Land George

Gordon now lives on, and for Building a rolling House thereon;

An Ingrossed Bill, entituled, An Act to divide Prince George's County, and

to erect a new one by the Name of Frederick County; and,

An Ingrossed Bill, entituled, An Act to divide Dorchester and Queen-Anne's Counties, and to erect a new County out of the upper Parts thereof by the Name of Prince William County;

Were severally Read and Assented to, and sent to the Upper House,

with the Paper Bills, by Col. Colvill, and Mr. William Wilkinson.

Col. Lloyd, from the Upper House, delivers Mr. Speaker the Bill, entituled, An Ast for the Gauge of Barrels for Pork, Beef, Pitch, Tar, and Tare of Barrels for Flour or Bread, "Indoised, "By the Upper House of Assembly, Sept- 26, 1745, Read the Second Time, and will Pass, with the following Amendments. To add [Turpentine] after the Word [Tar] in the Title, and so throughout the Bill; and to insert a Clause to limit the Time for commencing an Action after the Offence is committed.

Gentlemen,

E cannot help observing, that the Penalties and Forseitures in the Bill entituled, An All for the Gauge
of Barrels for Pork, Beef, Pitch, Tar, and Tare of Barrels for Flour or Bread, are not appropriated
to the Lord Proprietary, as we think they ought to be: But as they are very small in this Bill, and that our
Proceeding may be with as little Interruption or Difference as possible, we shall not insist on any Amendment
to this Purpose; tho' we hope this will never be drawn into, or urged as, a Precedent.
