By the Committee appointed by the Honourable, the Lower House of Assembly, to enquire into the Truth of the Facts tet forth in the l'eilton of George Plater, Elq; and Elexabeth Calvert an Infant, by Onorio Renelini, ber next Friend ; June 15, 1747.

OUR Committee, upon Enquiry, do find the several Facts set forth in the fair Petition, as be tree; a wincen Petition they pray Leave to refer. And it is also made appear to your Committee, that the fair Plater and Razolini, as Executors of Mrs. Calvert, have obtained judgment and Condemnstion of the Effects of Mrs. Eyde, in the Provincial Court, for the full Sum of Money due from the faid Samuel Hyde, to them, ss Acces Mails e lizabeth Care. rt, and the Costs of Suit; and also that as much as was due to the fait Mr. Plater, has been live with condemned for his Uie, with the Costs due to him on his Suit. They also take Leave to represent the Agree ment mentioned in the taid Petition, which is in the Words and Figures following.

Whereas George Plater and Onorio Razolini, have obtained Attachments out of his Loreichip's Previncial Comme now fi ting, against the Estects of Mr. Samuel Hyde, of London, Merchant wiz. George Plater, on his proper Ace count, for the Sum or 1932 1. 2 s. 7 d. 2 q. Sterling ; and George Plater, and Onerie Roselini, as Executors of Refere Carvert, Widow, deceased, for the sum of 1596 l. 131. 9d. Sterling. And whereas it is agreed by the said George and Onorso, to share equally whatever may be condemned of the Effects of the fail formal Eggs, (that is to lay) the faid George to have one Moiety, or half Part; and the faid George and Cherie, Executers as afore-" faid, the other Moiety or halt Part, and not in Proportion to our Claims; and to pay equally between them all " Fees and Charges that have or may accrue on the faid Attachments, and not in Proportion to their sweets Clair "To the Performance of which Agreement, We do hereby bind ourselves, our Heirs, Exercion, Administrators " and Affigue, to each other, in the Penal Sum of Two Thousand Ponade Sterling. In Witness mismed, we have " hereunto interchangeably set our Hands and Seals, this 23d Day of April, 1746.

Hopper and Mr. Dulany were sent to acquaint his Excellency, this House hath prepared an Address to him, and desires to know when and where he will please to receive it: They return, and acquaint Mr. Speaker, they deliver'd their Message, and that the Governor was pleased to signify, he was ready to receive the Address immediately in the Conference Chamber.

Col. Hooper and Mr. Dulany were ordered to present the Address.

The Governor communicates to Mr. Speaker the following Answer to the Address of this House, viz.

Gentlemen of the Lower House of Assembly, HAVE enquired into the subject Matter of your Address, in Relation to the one Peund of Tebacco per Poll, assessed upon the taxable Inhabitants of this Province, by the Governor and Council, in the Year 1744, by Virtue of the Act of Assembly for Regulating our Mil tia, and understand that the said Tobacco was intended to fatisfy the Charges incurred by the Indian Conspiracy; but tho' it has been levied, it has not been applyed; so lies ready to be disposed of as the Legislature shall think proper.
