Stoddard, which is upon a Matter of such Importance to all the Eritify Colonies upon the Continent of America, that I thought myself obliged to lay it immed arely before you, for your Consideration, and make no Doubt but you will readily and chearfully give all the Minitance that can be reasonably expected from us upon this Occa-

His will serve to inform your Honeur, that by Dispatches I have received from albany and Northampson, I find, that the Indians of the Six Nations are generally engaged in the War against the French of Canada; that diverse Parties of them are now out, and others daily offering themseives; which is a Point the neighbouring Governments have been labouring to carry ever fince the Beginning of the War, as a Matter of very great and general Concern and Welfare to all his Majetry's Colonies upon the Continent; and if this Spirit, which feems throughly railed, and has been hisherto happily kept up, is cherished, and properly managed and directed, it may, by the Biessing of God, prove of unspeakable Bencht for the Sasety of his Majesty's Colonies in North-America. refer your Honour to an Extract from Col. Steddard's Letter to me, for a more particular Account of this Affair; and would observe, that Col. Jeonlon and Mr. Lidius, whose Influence on the Influence has been serviceable in bringng about this great Event, are under such lingagements as they are not able to fulfil, without proper Supplies from hese Governments; and if for Want of that, the Indians should suffer any Disappointment, 'tis more than probable hey will be disgusted at their being left in the Lurch by us, and will fall intirely into the Interest of the French's which will be more fatal to these Colonies, than any Thing that has yet befallen us.
