in going to and returning from the Southward: Refides as our Neighbours have the work of proper to give the Indians some Presents, to keep them steady in their Friendship to his Majesty's Subjects; if we do nothing of the same Kind, it is very probable the Indians will conclude, we are really their formies; and how far upon such a Conclusion they may carry their Resentment, cannot be foreseen.
