them. And we are willing to suppose, that your Excellence's Nomination of the Gerfferrance that Office, was rether to supply the Vacancy occasioned by the Death of the late Treation zer, in the Interval or Assembly, than to deprive this House of their antient Right of Appointment to the faid Office, in Concurrence with the Upper House. We cannot therefore confident with our Duty as Representatives of the People, give up this Part of their Right; and as we have not the least View of encroaching on the Prerogatives of the Government, to we humbly hope your Excellency will not attempt to deprive us of that Right we have enjoyed in the Nomination of the Treasurers of this Province.

figned, on Behalf of the House, by the Honourable Speaker.

Mr. Key and Mr. Thomas were fent to acquaint the Governor that this House hath prepared an Address to him, and desire to know when and where he will please to receive it: They return and acquaint Mr. Speaker that the Governor fignified to them, that he would be ready in half an Hour's Time, to receive the Address in the Conference-Chamber.
