Centiemen of the Lower House of Assembly, HE me ofed Letter to me from Col. Cresap, relating to the Behaviour of the Indians, I have thought SAM. OGLE. proper to lay besere your House, for your Consideration.

To his Excellency SAMUEL COLE, E/q: Maryland.

May it p'ease your Excellency,

Have just now received Advice by a Man of Credit from the Ohio, that the Indian Chiefs, who intended to bave waited on your Excellency left Fall, were all ready to fet out on their intended Journey; but the Penntyivania Traders industriously set on them, and told them, that they would be put in Prison and hanged, for the
Blan of Mr. Parker's that was killed by the Indians; and many other frightful Stories; which deterred them
from their intended Journey. I have hed jundry Companies of Indian Parisons pussing and repassing, some of which have been very insolent and soucy; in particular, a Company of about 44, who had three I omen and two Boss Prisoners with them, taken from the Catawbees, while the Men were out hunting. The Men coming tome at Night from their Hunt, to their great surprize, found their Wives and Children, some killed and some taken arway; they sursued the Enemy, and in some Days came up with them, and sought them for a considerable Time; but being overpower'dly a superior Number, they areas off for a Time, and then came up again, and attacked them twice more; and by what I can learn from them, would have overcome them, if a Company of a Warming of the San National and the san in the san and the san in the san in the san areas to the same and the san in the san areas to the san in the san areas to the san in the san areas to the same and the san areas to the same area 25 Warriors of the Six Nation's had not met the others auto had the Prisoners; who say they killed three of the eight Catawbecs, and the rest made their Escaps: They say they were 60 in Number of the Five Nations; but eight Catawbers, and the rest made their Escape: They say they were 60 in Number of the Five Nations; but awhite the it was with the 25 or no. These Indians sleyed at my House four Days, and complained of Hunger; I gave them at their sins in my two Eushels of Mad, and one Bushel of Corn; and as it was had Weather, I took the three Coptains in my flores to lodge; they being very naked for Cleathe, complained that they had lost their Cloaths and Guis aimest all in Fight; and one of the Coptains told me, that he was Conaladago's Brother, who was the Speaker at the Treat; if Lancaiter. They held several Councils here, and told me that I was their Brother, and that they had given me this Land, and that they had no P wider or Lead to carry them home; but that I must give them founder and Lead and Knises and Flints and Stockings and I an mybawks, and mend their Kettles and Cans; on which I gave them 20 lb. Weight of Powder, and sime Lead; but they not being satisfied, talled a rother Council, and wanted more Visitals: I then gave them two Flitches of Bacon, and sour Bishels of Meal: Cans; on a bin I gave them 20 10. Weight of resider, and time them; out they not verify jarajea, talka arother Council, and wanted more Visuals: I then gave them two Flitches of Bacen, and four Billhels of Meal;
they complaining they avanted on the Road, and in Hopes of being rid of them; but flayed, and eat up the
Vicinals given them. They then called a third Council, and wanted me to give them a Cow, which I told them
I could not do; at which they begen to be mad, and told me I was not good: On which I told them, if they
wanted to fight to let me know, for if they killed my Cow I would kill them; and so quitted their Council, and
and my Curs, expecting to have had a Fight: They went to their Cabin, loaded their Gurs, and fined off sesea and rom obout sheating and submitted all Night. Near Morning I found live all of my Hoos stee suith acal, undran about shouting and whoping all Night. Neat Morning I found siveral of my Hogs shot with acad, undran about shouting and whoping all Night. Neat Morning I found siveral of my Hogs shot with sirrows; they stole sunary I bings, and went off. When they came to my House, they brought two fine large passing Manis, which were wonth at least 201. each, which they had still as they came along: I told them, that there were several white Min coming somed to setch the oforesaid Mar.s. and therefore I thought it their hist way to let the Creatures go; but they would not hearken to me: For instead of letting them locke, they hopped them, and kept them close by their Cabbins 'till they went off, and then took them away with them.
