Alino' we are not infensible of the Danger which, in Time of War, we may be liable to, from the Nearness of the French and their allied Indian Nations; yet the Happiness of Peace, we hope, will be a Means of present Security. And inasmuch as the People of this Province receive no Benefit from Traffick, or are provided with suitable Presents for those Indians in Alliance with the English; nor will our Circumstances admit of laying any new Burthens for procuring fuch; we therefore cannot, confiltent with our Duty, increase any Charge upon our Constituents for that Purpose.
