By the Committee appointed by the Honourable the Lower House of Assembly, to enquire into the Truth of the Facts set forth in the Petition of Thomas Catterall. June 18, 1752.

W E find a written Paper, alleged to be the Will of Thomas Robinson, but neither proved nor under Seal, marked A. We find the Deposition of Elizabeth Bolton and Elizabeth Righy, which does not appear to us to be taken in the Presence of the adverse Party, or that he had Notice; which the Petitioner alleges was impracticable, the Deponents being beyond Sea. Also a Power of Attorney from I homas Catterall the Petitioner, and others, to a certain Capt. John Lancaster, dated June, 1721, marked D. It appears to us, by the Affidavits of the said John Lancaster, and his Brother Joseph Lancaster, that the

It appears to us, by the Affidavits of the said John Lancaster, and his Brother Joseph Lancaster, that the aforesaid Thomas Catterall, the Petitioner, is the same Person mentioned in the Deposition of Elizabeth Bolton and Elizabeth Right. It appears likewise by Mr. Benjamin Pearce, that Mrs. Knight's Son, whom she

had by Mr. Thomas Robinson, died under Age.

That it appears by the Deposition aforesaid, marked D, that two of the Sisters of Mr. Robinson, viz.

Alice and Anne, are both dead; but whether the other two Sisters are dead does not appear.

Col. Hooper delivers to Mr. Speaker the following Report:

We find the Act of Assembly, made in the Year 1720, in Favour of Richard Bennett, Eq; who purchased from the Surveyor General, Maurice Birchfield, Eq; Turkey Point, as Land belonging to the Crown, marked C. It also appears by a Receipt on the Back of a Copy of a Record of a Decree of the Duchy Chamber of Lancoster, that the Sum of 1918 1.6s. 4d. Sterling Money, in Odober, 1725, was paid; but whether Thomas Robinson, at the Time of his Death, was indebted to Peregrine Brown, or the Crown, does not appear to this Committee.

All which is humbly submitted to the Consideration of your Honourable House.
