Clause be not inserted in the faid Oath, it be reported to the House; such Chase being agreeable to the Oath taken by the Judges in England, and Resolved to be necessary here; wie.

"To do equal Law and Right to all the King's Subjects, rich and poor; and not to delay say Person of common Right, for the Letters of the King; the Lord Propriessy, or of any other, or for any other "Cause; but if any such Letters come to them, they shall proceed to do the Law, the same Letters not with standing."

And that a Copy of these Resolves be made and given to the laid Commissed, when they have our every Sessions; and that making and giving such Copies be the undoubted Duty of the Cierk of this France, and within the Purview of his Oath.

Resolved also, That this Province is not under the Circumstances of a conquered Country; that if it were, the present Christian Inhabitants thereof would be in the Circumstances, not of the Conqueror, it being a Colony of the English Nation, encouraged by the Crown to transplant themselves hither, for the Sake of improving and enlarging it's Dominions; which, by the Blessing of God upon their Endeavours, at their own Expence and Labour, has been in great measure obtained a And its scanically Expland, that whoever shall advance, that his Majesty's Subjects, by such their Endeavours and Success, have seriested any Part of their English Liberties, are not Wellwishers to the Country, and mistake it's happy Constitution.

Resolved also, That if there be any Presence of Conquest, it can be only supposed against the Planta Indianal Institute Indiana Indianal Institute Indianal Indianal

Resolved surther, That this Province hath always hitherto had the Common Law, and such general Statutes of England, as are securitative of the Rights and Liberties of the Subject, and such Acts of Assembly as were made in the Province to suit it's particular Constitution, as the Rule and Standard of it's Government and such dicature; such Statutes and Acts of Assembly being subject to the like Rules of Common Law, or equitable Construction, as are used by the sudges in construing Statutes in England; which unpry Rules have, by his Majesty and his Royal Ancestors, and also by his Lordship and his Noble Ancestors, or some of them, been hitherto approved, by having the Commissions of Indicature, to include Directions of that Donne to the several judicial Magistrates; unless those Words have at any Time been casually or carelessy omitted by the Officers in this Province, that drew such Commissions.

Resolved. That the levying and taking the Sum of Twelve Pence Sterling per Hoghest, by the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary of this Province, on all Tobacco exported out of the same, under Pretence and Colour of the Act of 1704, is not warranted by Law. Resolved, Nemine contradicente, That if the above Act of 1704 had been in Force from the Restoration of the Government by the Crown to the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, to this Time; yet, the Sum of Three Pence Sterling, Part of the said Twelve Pence Sterling, agreeable to the plain Construction of the abovementioned Act, of 1704, and her late Majesty Queen Anne's Instructions to her Governor here when the said Act was in Force, ought be applied towards the purchasing of Arms and Ammunition for the Desence of this Province.

The House adjourns till 2 of the Clock Afternoon.
