VIII PROVIDED airways, and be it Enacted, That all such German or French Persons imported, or coming into this Province as aforefaid, if Quakers, shall be allowed, instead of taking the Oaths herein before directed, to affirm to the Effect thereof, before the Person by this Act impowered to administer such Oaths; and if Years, the Oaths aforefaid shall be administered to them, by the said Person, according to the Directions of the Act of Parliament, made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty King George the Second, entituled. An Act for naturalizing such foreign Brotestants, and others therein mentioned, as are fired, or half erie, in any of his Majesty's Colonies, in America; and in Case of Refusal, to be deemed Papults; within the Intent and Meaning of this Act.

THIS Act to continue for three Years, and unto the End of the next Session of Assembly, which shall

happen after the Expiration of the faid three Years.

On reading the Bill entituled, An Act for regulating the Rates of Carriage, and Quartering Soldiers in Public Houses, within this Province, for kis Majesty's Service; with the Amendments proposed (by the Upper House) to be made thereto: The Question was put, Whether this House doth agree to the Amendments proposed by the Upper House, or Not? Resolved in the Affirmative.
