Col. Hammond, and Samuel Chamberlaine, Esq; from the Upper House, acquaint Mr. Speaker, that the Governor requires the Attendance of the Lower House immediately in the Upper House.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and (with the rest of the Members of the Lower House) attended the Gover-

nor in the Upper House; where his Excellency made the following Speech, viz.

Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly,

MEET you at this Time to give you an Opportunity of providing for your own immediate Safety, and of contributing to the Execution of a Plan, that, in Obedience to his Majesty's Instructions to General Stander, has been dincerted, for preventing the further Encroachments of his Majesty's ambitious Enemies on his America: Dominions, and dispossessing them of what they have most unjustly, and in manifest Violation of Freuties, lately made themselves Matters of. In Confidence that you will keep them Secret, I shall, for your Sitisfaction, lay before your a Copy of the Minutes of the Proceedings of a Council of War, held at Not Mot together with some Papers that I received from the General, therewith; whence you will learn what Surplies are expected from his Majesty's several Colonies on the Continent, towards carrying the propoiled Plan into Execution: And as I doubt not but you are affected with as deep a Sense of the Danger of fuffering the Fremy to make any farther Progress, and of your Duty to his Majesty, as any of your Fellow Sui cets in the neighbouring Provinces, I perfunde myself you will acquit yourselves, on this Occasion, as well as the most Zealous of them; and that you will chearfully exert your utmost Endeavours to render the life is primes Successful that are undertaken for our common Safety, and in the Event of which we are to nearly be cruded.

I need not orderve to you, that our Circumstances and Prospect are much altered since last Spring; you

are . It too well acquainted with the Isiue of the Expedition, in which the Troops that his Majesty had been gracically pleased to order from Europe to our Assistance, and some of the Provincial Forces, were then engaged, and the Confequences thereof to these Southern Colonies: Most of the Delaware and Shawanese Tribes, who were then educated our Friends, the French, by their Artifices, have now withdrawn from their Attachment to his Miljerty's Subjects, and instigated them to make our Frontier Inhabitants feel and experience the Calmittee of an Indian War: With Impunity have these Blood-thirsty Savages laid great Part of Three Provinces Defolite; flushed with Victory they bid us Defiance, and infolently threaten, that their cruel Rage will not be fate fied with less than our Extirpation; But I decline to enlarge on this Topic, lest I should seem to far set, that your Refentment is not already sufficiently raised by the Conduct of these Barbarians, or that you continue indifferent Spectators of their Transactions: That such a Suspicion would be groundless, and most unjuit, I am c reddent; and natter myself, that you will let nothing, at this Time, divert you from providing against their Incurions for the future, and for the Services that I have now recommended to your

I try I care to mention once more the Insufficiency of our Laws to oblige the Service of any one in Defonce is their Country, hoping that you will take the same under your Consideration; and as our Sasety at this Salam, muit, in a great Meadure, depend on the Militia's being well Armed, Disciplined, and under I for r Regulations, that you will supply the Desects of the Militia-Laws at present in Force, with such an

Act, as the Situation of Affairs at this Juncture calls for and requires.
