Foundation, would be productive of many great Advantages to the Inhabitants," we are much furprised that instead of endeavouring to perfect the Bill we sent you up for that Purpose, by propoling Amendments to such Parts as you thought " imperfect and very exceptionable," you should detain it so long in your House, as to make it, in your own Opinion, too late for us to enter into a full Consideration of any you might make, without protracting the Session to an unreasonable Length.

The Bill, we think, is plain and simple, and as we fent it up to you above three Weeks ago, there has been full Time enough for the Two Houses to have settled and adjusted any Difference of Sentiments they could have entertained about it, and thereby have brought it to a happy Issue this

Settion.

But whatever might have been your Honours Motives for postponing the Consideration of a Matter to important, to fuch as are comparatively very trivial, we are of Opinion, although it may be too late to bring it to Perfection at this Time, that it may answer a very good Purpose, to return us the Bill, with your Objections now.

You wave it at present, you say, till the Assair can be maturely considered.

It is our Intention to publish the Bill, with any Objections you may be pleased to offer against it; and as we conceive this will be putting the Whole into a proper Channel, not only for the mature Consideration of ourselves, but of the Public; and as it will thereby undergo such a Discussion s may enable us in future to render it more perfect, we hope your Honours will now return us the

Bill, with fuch Propolitions for Amendments as you may think expedient.

As it has never been a Practice, till lately in some Instances introduced by your Honours, to detain in your House, any Bills sent up from this, nor has it been customary for this House to keep Copies of fuch Bills, we are the more obliged to press you for a Return of this Bill, which we cannot submit to the Consideration of our Constituents, (as we are very desirous of doing) unless you will furnish us with the Opportunity, by fending it down to us.

On Motion, ORDERED, That Mr. Jonas Green do Print in the Maryland Gazette, the Act for

the speedy Recovery of small Debts, &c. which was passed this Session.
