Your Committee gave their Reasons in their Report last Sessions (to which they beg Leave to refer this Honourable House) why the Money in Iron Chest N° 1, was not then counted, which they thought it their Duty to do, and as the Act is now near expiring, your Committee thought it more peculiarly necessary at this Time to count the said Money, that they might give the fullest Report in their Power of the State of the Office, and accordingly applied to Dr. Steuart, to have Liberty to count the Money, and had for Answer, That the Commissioners did begin since last Session to sort and prepare the Money for Counting, and when they had sorted about 4000 l.
