Up in reading the Second Time, and maturely confidering the Letter from the Sp aker of the House of Burgetles of Virginia, and the Refolves therein mentioned, RESOLVED, That this House doth unanimously concur with the House of Burgesses in Virginia in the said R solutions.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY. That the Representatives of the Freemen of this Province, in their legislative Capacity, with the Asient of the other Part of the Legislature, ha e the sole Right to lay Taxes and Impolitions on the Inhabitants of this Province, or their Property and Effects; and that the laying, impofing, levying, or collecting any Tax on or from the Inhabita tants of Moryland, under Co'our of any other Authority, is unconstitutional, and a direct Violation of the Rights of the Freemen of this Province.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That it is the undoubted Privilege of the Inhabitants of this Province, to petition their Severeign for the Rediess of Grievances; and that it is lawful and expedient to procure the Concurrence of his Mujesty's other Colonies, in dutiful Addresses,

praying the Royal Interpolition in Favour of the vi lated Rights of America.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That all Trials for Treason, Mispession of Treason, or for any Felony or Crime whatever, committed and done in this Province, ought of Right to be half and conducted in and before the Courts of Law held within this Province, according to the fixed and known Course of proceeding; and that the seizing any Person or Persons, suspected of any Crime whatever, committed in this Province, and fending such Person or Persons to Places beyond the Sea to be tried, is highly derogatory of the Rights of British Subjects, as thereby the inestimable Privilege of being tried by a Jury from the Vicinage, as well as the Liberty of summoning and producing Witnesses on such Trial, will be taken away from the Party accused.

ORDERED, That Mr. Speaker do write to Peyton Randuph, Eig; Speaker of the House of

Burgesses of the Dominion of Virginia, and acquaint him, that this House hath unanarously

concurred with the House of Burgesses in Virginia in their is Resolutions.

ORDERED, That Mr. Speaker do write I etters to the Speakers of the several other l'ouses of Representatives in the British Colonies upon this Continent, informing them of the Resolutions of this House, and desiring their Concurrence therewith.

ORDERED, That the Resolves of this House be immediately, after the End of this Session,

printed in the Maryland Gazette.
