IN Obedience to the Order of the Honourable House, your Committee have enquired into the Facts aforesaid, and do find that the said John Stone Hawkins, by his sait Will and Pestument, duted the 25th Day of November, 1763, devised Part of his real Estate to be fold for Payment of Debis," and all the Remainder of his Lands or real Estate, he gave to his Daughter Sufannah Prifeilla, in Tail, with divers Remainders over, as by Copy of faid Will hereunte annexed will appear, and therein appointed the Petitioner and a certain George Frazier, fince deceased, his Executors! That the faid Susannah Priscilla is fill living, a Minor under the Ago of Fourteen Tears And your Committee further find, that by the last Settlement made with the Commissary General (including an Allowance of One Thousand Pounds Maryland Ourrency for Lands fold) It appears that there is a Balance due to the faid George Frazier Haw-All, Exceptor as aforefaid, of Fourteen Hundred and Sixty-fix Pounds Nineteen Shillings and Seven-pence Gold Currency: And your Committee have examined the faid Settlement and find it sight, except an Error of a few Shillings in casting up, which reduces said Balance to Fourteen Hundred and Sixty-fix Pounds Three Shillings and Five-pence Current Money aforesaid.
