T U E S D A Y, March 25, 1777.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Galloway. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. William Allein, a delegate returned for Calvert county, appeared in the house, and after having qualified agreeable to the constitution and form of government, in the presence of Mr. Speaker and the other members, he took his seat. Mrs. Bowie appeared in the house.

Mr. O. Sprigg brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to prevent the

distilling of grain; which was road the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The house proceeded to ballot for a committee to prepare and bring in the bill to assess an equal tax on all property within this state; and Mr. Hall, Mr. S. Chase, Mr. Sheredine, Mr. Smith, Mr. Veazey, Mr. Brust, and Mr. J. T. Chase, were elected a committee for that purpose.

The memorial of the Roman catholics of Saint Mary's, Charles, and Prince-George's counties, praying that an act may pass to confirm to them such lands, goods, and enattels, as their church or its ministers were in possession of, at the time of passing the declaration of rights, in the same manner with those of the church of England—And a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, for an act of assembly for opening a public road from a certain serry on Patowmack river, to Frederick-Town, and for appointing commissioners to say out the same—were severally read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
