charged. Thall be attached to such classes of the militia that they may not be obliged to march again until all the other classes have marched, and it shall come to their turn in rotation."

The bill was endorfed accordingly, and fent to the fenate, with the amendments proposed, by

Mr. Earle and Mr. H. Wilson.

On reading and confidering that part of the memorial of the commissioners of the loan office relating to their falary, RESOLVED, That the faid commissioners be allowed; each; the yearly falary of three hundred pounds common money, to commence at the expiration of one year from the time of their appointment.

On motion, Resolved, That the governor and the council be requested to order one hundred stand of arms, out of those repaid by congress, or any others, to be sent for the use and defence of Calvert county, upon the same terms as those granted for Kent, and Talbot counties; with a proper number of cartridge boxes, and fifteen hundred cartridges fuitable for faid arms. 11
