take the oath prescribed to be taken by a law of the state, he apprehends his estate will be seized by the British government; and therefore praying to be excused from taking the said oath.

Adjourned till next day 9 o'clock.

T H U R S D A Y, April 9, 1778.

HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Maxwell, Mr. Ward, Mr. Kent, and Mr. Sheredine. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. H. Willon appeared in the house.

A letter from his excellency the governor, enclosing a memorial from John Lasavar, of Frederick county, proposing to raise a troop of horse, to be considered as part of the quota of this

state, was laid before the house and read.

RESOLVED, That the governor and the council be empowered and requested, during this seffion of assembly, to appoint and commission militia officers for Czecil, Harford, and Caroline counties, or any other county where it may be judged necessary.

Sent up for concurrence by Mr. Murray and Mr. Thomas.

Mr Chew has leave of absence.

Matthew Tilghman, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a letter from Normand Bruce, Esq; of the 2d of March last, notifying that he had, in consequence of his appointment to meet at Fredericksburg, on the 15th day of January last, attended at that place, with other commissioners from this state, for several days without being met by any commissioners from the states of Virginia or North-Carolina.
