enter into a bond or obligation to the justices of the orphans court of Anne-Arundel county, with fuch sufficient security as the said justices shall approve, in the penal sum of two thousand pounds current money, conditioned as follows; That if the faid Cassandra Ducker shall well and truly lodge in the treasury of this state, all such sums of money as she shall receive on account of the fale of certain lands and mills, late the effate of John Ducker, deceased, within twenty days after she shall receive the same, and which lands and mills are directed to be sold pursuant to an act of affembly of this state, entitled, An act to enable Cassandra Ducker, widow and executrix of John Ducker, late of Anne-Arundel county, deceased, to sell and dispose of certain lands and mills therein mentioned, and also shall well and truly comply with, and perform all matters and things in the faid act mentioned on her part to be done and performed, then the above obligation

to be void, else to remain in full force. Which amendments were read and agreed to, and the bill past for engrossing.

Mr. R. Goldsborough from the committee appointed to enquise into the state and condition of the navy of this state, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a report, which was read and ordered to lie on the table.
