faid petitions will involve questions of such magnitude and nature, that a committee of this house, during the fetting of any one fession, will not be competent to the investigation thereof, so as to do equal justice to the petitioners. Your committee are therefore of opinion, that a committee appointed in the receis of the affembly will be the most eligible mode by which justice can be done to all parties concerned.
