there are a great number of nonjurors in Harford, and very obstinate, and the sheriff's collection thereby rendered tedious and difficult, we are of opinion, that in the present instance it might be proper in the legislature to relax the penalties incurred by the said John Taylor, in consequence of his non-compliance with the act to raile the supplies for the year 1778.

All which is submitted to the confideration of the honourable house.
