The Bill, entitled, An Act to compel the Attendance of the Members of the General Assembly,
was read the second Time, gaſed, and sent to the Senate by Mr. Letterbury and Mr. Magruder.
The Bill, entitled, A Supplement to the Act, entitled, An Act to make the Bills of Credit issued
by Congress and the Bills of Credit emitted by Acts of Assembly and Resolves of the late
Conventions a legal Tender in all Cases, was read the second Time, and the Question was
