HE house met. Present as on yesterday, except Mr. S. Hanson. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The engroffed bill, No. 4, was read and affented to, and fent to the senate, with the paper

bill thereof, by Mr. Smoot and Mr. M'Gee.

Mr. Williamson appeared in the house. Mr. Keene hath leave of absence until Sunday next.

Mr. Chase brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee appointed to consider and report the most effectual and proper ways and means to comply with the requisition of congress of the 6th of October last, beg leave to report, That they have maturely confidered the subject matter referred to them, and have come to the following resolutions.

Ist. That the assessment and tax under the late laws to raise the current supplies are unequal and unjust; that by the present system the holders of money are required to pay more than they ought, but by an evafion of the law they contribute very little to the public burthen; wherefore your committee are of opinion, that some mode be adopted to lay an equal tax on money, and to compel payment of fuch tax.

2d. That it is the opinion of the committee, that not less than a monthly tax of £.3 on every £. 100 of property in this state would raise our quota of 15 million of dollars monthly, as re-

quired by congress, which for the 9 months would be £. 27 for every £. 100 of property.

3d. That it is impracticable to raile the sum of 14,220,000 dollars required by congress, as the quota of this state, in nine months (to wit, from the first of February to the first of October inclusive).

4th. That it is improper and imprudent to impose, and impracticable to raise, the whole of

the anove fum by a tax and affestment on property. 5th. That it is improper to impose, and impracticable to collect, the monthly tax as required

by congress; because the late assessment laws require a revision, and an alteration as to the mode or affeffing; because, from the dispersed situation of our people, a very great number of collectors must be employed, and the expence of collection thereby greatly encreased; and because our monthly sum required is beyond the abilities of the people to pay.

6th. That the probable current expence of this government, from the 1st of January next until the first of January, 1782, will be very considerable.

7th. That the debt of this state may be estimated at about £. 915,892 6 9 common current money, as follows, to wit:
