portant to be imparted to men, who, with the best intentions, from the want of knowledge,

might make an improper and dangerous use of them.

We are of opinion, that the bill as amended, even without the clause (which must be struck out, in case you persist in rejecting our amendments) contains some useful regulations, and may prevent many of the inconveniences and injuries intended to be remedied, and therefore we accede to your proposal of enacting into a law the other clauses of the bill, leaving out the clause about which we differ, and which (confidering the near approach of the fevere leafon of the year) together with every thing elfe not absolutely necessary now to be done, we are very desirous of leaving to the confideration of a future fession.

Joseph Sim, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a letter from George Plater and James Forbes, dated Philadelphia, December 13, 1779, directed to the honourable president of the senate and the honourable the speaker of the house of delegates; which was read and reserved to the committee appointed to report on general Washington's letters, &c.

and insert "Anne-Arundel." In the ninth line of the third page, between the words "less" and "whereas," infert "which faid parcels of land are fituate, lying, and being, in Baltimore county." In the ninth line of the fixth page, between the words "authorifed" and "empowered," ftrike out the word "and." And after the word "empowered," infert the words "directed and required." In the fourteenth line of the same page, strike out the words "ninetynine years, with a clause or covenant." And in the fifteenth line, strike out the words " therein contained, that the same shall be renewable for." And in the beginning of the fixteenth line, strike out the word "ever," and insert "forty years." In the eighteenth line of the seventh page, between the word "dam" and the word "and," insert the following, "and keeping the same in repair to the amount of one third part of the labour (materials not included) to far as extends to fuch part of the dam as may be fo erected as aforefaid, during fuch time as the faid William Whetcroft shall continue to work and carry on the faid mill.

Which amendments were read and agreed to, and the bill passed for engrossing.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill for calling out of circulation certain bills of credit emitted by acts of affembly. ORDERED, That Mr. Chase, Mr. Henry, Mr. Deye, Mr. M'Mechin, and Mr. J. Hanson, do prepare and bring in the same.

The bill to prevent distilling grain into spirit was read the second time, and the question put, That the said bill do pass? The year and nays being called for by Mr. Deye, appeared as sollow:
