THE committee to whom was referred the memorials of Thomas Brook Hodgkin, clerk of the general court on the weftern shore, Elie Vallette, keeper of the records of the late pre ogative office, and William Hyde, register in chancery, beg leave to report, that the movements of the common enemy have made it repeatedly necessary to remove the papers of the respective offices to places of greater safety, which has been productive of much confusion and disorce; that the security of individuals, interested in the preservation of the said papers, as well as the dispact of judicial proceedings, makes it necessary that the papers aforesaid should be methodically arranged; that great care, confi erable time and attention, will necessarily be employed in the execution of this business, which being foreign to the duty of the petitioners, cannot be expected will be pessed by them without a particular and satisfactory reward. That one thousand pounds to Mr. Hodgkin, seven hundred and fifty pounds to Mr. Vallette, seven hundred and fifty pounds to Mr. Hyde, will, in the opinion of your committee, be an adequate compensation for the trouble of arranging alphabetically and methodically the papers of their respective offices.

That the petitions of William Gibson, clerk of Baltimore county, and Walter Hanson, of Charles county, are answered by the encrease of officers sees, as far as is convenient and proper

to do at this time.

Which was read.

Mr. Chase brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act for calling out of circulation certain bills of credit emitted by acts of assembly; which was read the first time and

ordered to lie on the table.
