HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Williamson and Mr. Norris. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Brown, from the committee appointed to enquire into the state of the militia, &c. bringe

in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee appointed to enquire into and report the state and condition of the militia, and report their opinion what further regulations of the militia may be necessary, and what measures should be now adopted to put this state into the best condition for defence, and to carry on the war, beg leave to report to the honourable house, that from the best information they have been able to collect, the militia throughout this state are at this time, and have been for a long time past, in a disrespectable condition, owing, as your committee conceive, to a neglect of duty in the officers, and the smallness of the fines imposed by the acts of assembly for delinquency, for want of authority to compel non-commissioned officers to accept their appointments, and want of arms and accourrements, of which, from the best information your committee has been able to procure, there is but a very small number belonging to or within the state; your committee therefore are of opinion, the most effectual means for regulating and putting the militia of this state in a proper condition for defence, will be, to repeal all the laws heretofore made for regulating the said militia, as they are found to be quite inadequate to the purpose for which they were originally intended, and to enact one general law for that purpose on a more extensive fystem.

Your committee are further of opinion, that speedy and effectual measures ought to be taken to procure arms, ammunition, and accoutrements, sufficient for the militia of this state, and that the same be either deposited in the most safe and convenient parts of the respective counties, whence they may be distributed upon any emergency, or put immediately into the hands of the

militia, making them accountable for the same, under proper penalties.

All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house. Signed by order,
