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RESOLVED, That the widows of the furgeons and furgeons mates, who have died or may hereaster die in the service of this state, and during the present war, shall be entitled during their widowhood to the half of the pay which their husbands were respectively entitled to while in the

fervice, the faid half pay to commence at the death of the faid officer.

RESOLVED, That the furgeons now in the quota of troops belonging to this state, shall have and receive within this state a similar quantity of land to that which the captains in the line are entitled to by the resolution of congress of the 16th of September, 1776; and that the surgeons mates shall receive a quantity similar to the lieutenants in the line; and that the same shall be exempted from taxation whilst they continue in the possession of such surgeon or surgeon's mate, and before any alienation thereof made, and not after.

All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house.
