5. That it is the opinion of the committee, that the draught horses and the waggons, with

their horses and harness, cannot be obtained by hire.

6. That it is the opinion of the committee, that this state has but three ways to procure money to comply with the requisition of the committee of co-operation. 1. By loan, which the committee conceive will be slow in its operation, and greatly inadequate to the demand. 2. By taxes, which, in the opinion of the committee, have been already imposed as far as the circumstances of the people will permit, and which, if encreased, cannot furnish money in time or in quantity sufficient to answer the requisition. 3. By an emission of paper money on the credit of this state, which the committee are of opinion may be attempted, if ample and permanent sunds can be given for redemption in a reasonable time; the only sunds which present themselves to the committee are, duties on imports and exports, rates on ordinary and marriage licences, taxes on gaming and luxury, and an assessment on property to supply any deficiency, and confiscated British property.

7. That it is the opinion of the committee, that it is not within the ability or power of this

state to comply with the requisition of the committee of co-operation.

8. That it is the opinion of the committee, that without the aid of British property, it is not within the ability or power of this state to procure any very considerable part of the supplies required, and that with the appropriation of confiscated British property, and the contribution of the citizens of this state, it may be in its power to surnish the greater part of the supplies required.

The committee beg leave to observe, that besides the sum necessary to comply with the above requisition, very considerable sums of money will be wanted to defray the transportation of the supplies, to purchase salted meat, to procure recruits to fill up our battalions, to obtain and sur-

nish the 2205 militia required, and to defray the expences of our government.

All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house.
