Ordered, That Mr. J. Hall, Mr. Cadwalader, and Mr. Bayly, do prepare and bring in the said bill.

The bill for finking the quota required by congress of this state of the bills of credit, &c. and the bill to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned, were sent to the senate by Mr. Earle and Mr. Cramphin.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to revive actions and process in the court of appeals, to enable any one judge to adjourn the said court, and to direct the oath of the judges in case of appeals from the court of chancery. Ordered, That Mr. Chase, Mr. McMechen, and Mr. Dent, do prepare and bring in the said bill.

Upton Sheredine, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the resolution respecting the general officers in the hospital department, endorsed; "By the senate, June 25, 1780: Read and assented to.

On a fecond reading of the bill to procure recruits to complete the battalions of this state in the service of the United States, &c. the question was put, That the number of recruits to complete the battalions of this state in the service of the United States, be apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of militia men in each county, and in the same ratio as is done by the act, entitled, An act for recruiting the quota of troops of this state in the American army, passed at November session 1779?
