THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Keene. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill to repeal the act, entitled, An act to restrict the delegates of this state in congress from engaging in any trade foreign or domestic. ORDERED, That Mr. M'Mechen, Mr. Eccleston, and Mr. Lethrbury, do prepare and bring in the said bill.

Mr. John Cox, one of the commissioners for Cæcil county under the act for the immediate supply of flour, &c. in consequence of an order of the last session, appeared at the bar of the house, and gave information as to his conduct, and laid before the house the proceedings of the commissioners for Cæcil county.

ORDERED, That Mr. Speaker inform Mr. Cox he is discharged from any further attendance; which was accordingly done.

A petition from the reverend Mr. Neil, of Queen-Anne's county, praying to be relieved from the penalties incurred by his not taking the oath of fidelity within the time prescribed by law, was preferred, read the first and second time, and rejected.

The house being informed that Mr. Barnes was unable to attend this session, on account of his having the gout, accepted the same as a sufficient excuse.

Mr. Chapline has leave of absence on account of his indisposition.

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
