W E D N E S D A Y, November 15, 1780.

HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Mills, Mr. Taylor, and Mr. McComas. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. James Chapline, a delegate returned for Washington county, appeared, and after qualifying in the usual manner, took his seat in the house. Mr. Crausurd has leave of absence until Monday next.

A letter of excuse from Mr. John Stull, for not attending on the day appointed for the meeting of the general assembly, with a conditional resignation, was laid before the house and read.

Thomas Stone, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a petition from John Polton and Mary Polton, of Anne-Arundel county, praying an act may pass to ratify the will of a certain Joseph Watson, according to the true intent and meaning of the testator; a petition from Mary Pindle, executrix of the last will and testament of colonel Edward Sprigg, late of Prince-George's county, praying an act may pass, empowering her to sell and dispose of part of a tract of land called Addition to Piles's Delight, for the benefit of the creditors of the deceased; severally endorsed; "By the senate, November 14, 1780: Read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

A letter from colonel William Fitzhugh, of the 7th of November; and copies of letters from the governor and council, of the 8th and 12th instant, to Samuel and Robert Purviance and others, merchants in Baltimore, with their answers, relative to the fitting out vessels to cruise in the bay.

The order of the day being read, on motion, That the house reconsider the resolution of the 11th of November, relative to the right of the house to take notice of the conduct of Mr. Hindman, a member thereof, the previous question was called for and put, That the said question be

now put? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Hindman then informed the house, he did not recollect he ever made use of the words with which he was charged; and thereupon the house proceeded to the examination of the witnesses in support thereof, and, after some time, adjourned till 3 o'clock.

POST MERIDIEM.

The house met. Mr. Frisby Freeland and Mr. Charles Williamson, two delegates returned for Calvert county, and Mr. Henry Dennis, a delegate returned for Worcester county, appeared, and after qualifying in the usual manner took their seats in the house.
