the western shore; one at — in Pocomoke; one at — in Wiccocomico; two at — in Nanticoke; one at — in Choptank; and one at Nes-town, Chester; on the eastern shore;

subject to the orders and directions of the governor and council.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that there he purchased, or built as soon as possible, one galley, to carry one eighteen pounder and two six pounders, with swivels, &c. &c. and one stoop or one schooner capable of carrying eight six pounders, and that they he well found, sitted, and manned, subject to the orders and directions of the governor and council.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that there also be purchased, or built as soon as posfille, a brig capable of carrying sourteen six pounders, and that she be well sound, sitted, and

manned, subject to the orders and directions of the governor and council.

That is is the opinion of the committee, that there be erected a small fort, of not less than fix nine or twelve pounders, with one or two block-houses, at Queen's creek, at the mouth of Patowmack.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that one company of artillery, to confift of one captain and one captain-lieutenant, and fixty-five non-commissioned officers and matroffes, be immediately railed, to ferve within the state for the war, and one company, or so many as may be necessary, constantly stationed at the said fort.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that two hundred men be raised, to serve on board the said barges or row-boars, and that the governor and council be authorised to appoint and

commission proper officers to command the faid barges and row-boats.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that one hundred marines be raifed, to serve on board the faid galley and schooner, or sloop and brig, and that the governor and council be au-

thorifed to appoint and commission proper officers to command the said vessels.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that the delegates from this state to congress be directed to request his Excellency Chevalier Luzerne, to solicit his Most Christian Majesty, our illustrious and good ally, to order two of his trigates to cruise near the capes of Chesapeake, for the protection of the trade of this state and Virginia, with the subjects of his Most Christian Majesty; and that this state will supply such frigates with provisions, and, if taken or lost, will pay the value of them in tobacco within three years after peace.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that the delegates from this state to congress be directed to represent to the minister of France and Monsieur Ternay, that if the French squadron now at Rhode-Island intend to winter in America, that there are several rivers in Chesapeake bay capable of receiving the said squadron, and where they may lie in persect safety; that the squadron can be amply surnished with provisions by the state, and on more reasonable terms than is done at present; that the provisions now consumed by the squadron may be applied to the support of the army of the United States under his Excellency general Washington; and that the squadron in Chesapeake bay will protect the two states of Virginia and Maryland, and secure the transportation of supplies to the continental army.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that to enable the governor and council to purchase or build the barges or row-boats, or vesses, and to raise the men above mentioned, that they be authorised to appropriate to those purposes one thousand hogsheads of good tobacco, and inspected

before the 2d of April 1779.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that to replace the one thousand hogsheads of tobacco, and to defray the expence to be incurred in pursuance of the above resolutions, that a tax of
ten pounds of tobacco be imposed on every one hundred pounds of property within the state,
payable before the first of April next; and that the makers of tobacco pay in tobacco, and that
those who do not make tobacco for sale, on making oath or lodging a certificate thereof with
the collector, be enabled to discharge their tax in paper money, at the current market price of
tobacco, to be ascertained by the commissioners of the tax of their county at the time of their

appointing affestors.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that a copy of any acts which may pass the Jegislature, on the subject of the above resolutions, be transmitted to the legislature of Virginia, with a request to them to surnish vessels for the protection of the trade of this bay, in proportion to the wealth and ability of their state compared with ours; and that they direct any vessels fitted out by their state, to act in conjunction with those from this state, or to cruise alternately, for the protection of the trade of the two states; and further to request the legislature of Virginia to join this state in its application to his Mott Christian Majesty for two frigates, and to undertake to surnish one half the provisions for the said frigates, and to pay one half the value of the said frigates, if taken or lost while employed in the protection of the trade of the two states; and further, that the legislature of Virginia be requested to join this state in its request, that the French squadron winter in this bay, if it remains in America during the winter.
