On reading a second time the petition of the reverend John Scott, and it appearing to this house, that the said John Scott hath taken the oath of allegiance to the state of Virginia, by a certificate under seal from the clerk of Prince-William county, RESOLVED, That the said John Scott be relieved from all his engagements entered into to the late council of safety, except so much thereof as relates to his going to the eastern shore of this state, or corresponding with any person within this state on public matters.

The bill for calling out of circulation the quota of this state of the bills of credit issued by

congress, &c. was sent to the senate by Mr. Hindman and Mr. M'Mechen.

The resolution in favour of the reverend John Scott, was sent to the senate by Mr. Ward and Mr. J. Stevenson.
