Mr. Bayly, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report: THE committee to whom the petitions of nonjurors were referred, beg leave to report, that they have gone through the feveral petitions to them referred, and it appearing to them, by fundry of the faid petitions, that the law for the relief of certain nonjurors, passed last session, did not get to several of the counties time enough for some of those relieved therein to comply with the same, your committee are therefore of opinion, that a further time should be allowed to those under such circumstances.

Your committee have also made out a list of the names of those who have now applied for relief, as will appear by the same herewith delivered, and are of opinion, that the petitioners ought to be relieved from the treble tax, and all the disabilities and disqualifications heretofore on them imposed, (except holding any office of trust or profit and voting at elections) on their taking the

oath of support and fidelity to this state.

Your committee have also considered the petition of Benedict Calvert, of Prince-George's county, and are of opinion, that he ought to be relieved on paying into the treasury, on or before the tenth day of March next, notes for forty hogsheads of tobacco, inspected under the late law, the tobacco to be in any warehouse of his county, and to average 950 to net.

Your committee have also considered the petition of William Cummings, of Frederick coun-

ty, and are of opinion that the prayer of his petition ought to be granted.

All which is submitted to the honourable house.
