Mr. Quynn, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to authorife the county courts to impose an affessment to defray their county charges; which was read the first time and ordered to be on the table.

Mr. Hanson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

THE committee, to whom was referred the letter from general Gift, respecting the officers and soldiers of the Maryland line, beg leave to report, that from a variety of causes, the United States have not complied with their engagements heretofore made with their officers and soldiers, which has occasioned great and unavoidable difficulties and distresses in the service, as well as indebted. Your committee have therefore come to the following resolutions, viz.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that the pay of the said officers and soldiers should be made good in specie, or the value thereof, from the 1st of January 1777, to the 1st of August

That it is the opinion of the committee, that the several sums of continental money received by the officers and soldiers, on account of their pay, within the dates aforesaid, should, in the settlement of their accounts, be estimated in specie, according to the value thereof at the times of its becoming due; and all cloathing and other things surnished by this state to its officers, and not properly chargeable to the United States, ought to be deducted out of their pay at the value in specie.

That it is the opinion of the committee, that one commissioner should be appointed to settle the accounts of all the officers and soldiers of the troops of this state in the continental service,

agreeable
