Mr. Bayly, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act to restrict the delegates of this state in congress from engaging in any trade either foreign or domestic; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

ORDERED, That the committee of grievances and courts of justice ascertain and tax the costs arising in consequence of their enquiry into the conduct of James Horner, and make report thereof to the house.
