so, in the Pennsylvania regiment, commanded by colonel Samuel Miles, he was wounded and taken at the battle of Long-Island, and soon after carried under the power of the enemy to Halitax.

That it appears the said Daniel Heester obtained permission of the board of war, in August 1777, to go to Halifax with a flag, for the purpose of effecting the release of said Jonathan Hagar, his brother-in-law, or if that could not be obtained, to fettle some bufiness with him re-

specting his estate, he being at that time of age.

Your committee further beg leave to report, that it appears Mr. Heester was confined, and otherwise ill used by the enemy at Halisax, and was prevented whilst there from doing business publicly with his brother-in-law. That faid Jonathan Hagar, however, executed a deed for the fourteen hundred acres of land, and the five lots aforesaid, as also a power of attorney to said Heester; and it further appears, as stated, that the said Heester, apprehensive of the consequences, if they should be found in his possession by the enemy, did not bring them off with him, so that they were not recorded within the time limited by the laws of this state.

It further appears to your committee, that the faid Heester, on receiving the said instruments of writing, had them, with a deed of partition made in consequence of them, recorded among

the land records of Washington county, on the 7th day of September, 1778.

It further appears, that the faid instruments of writing were not (in point of formality and requifite acknowledgment) executed according to law, but they are fully perfuaded, that the fitua-

tion of things was such as rendered it impossible.

Your committee further beg leave to report, that it is their opinion, a law should pass agreeable to the prayer of the petition, to make valid the recording the deeds after the time limited by law for that purpose, and to remedy any defects arising from the deed not having been executed agreeable to the laws of this state, which they conceive, from the particular circumstances of this case, could not be done.

Your committee further beg leave to report, that there is some reason to believe said Hagar has served as a soldier in the British army, but they are fully convinced, by the vouchers laid before them, that he was not actuated in so doing by any injurious designs against these United States, but merely with a view to extricate himself from a most hard and disagreeable situation, and that

he feveral times attempted to make his escape from the enemy.

It further appears to your committee, that notice was given in the Maryland Gazette, agreeable to a resolution of this house.

All which is submitted to the confideration of the honourable house.
